


Mission of FOHR

- "...work with Snohomish County and community partnerships... to preserve flora and fauna of the ridge in perpetuity...
- develop recreational and focused learning experiences for a diverse population...that will enhance the experience of Heybrook Ridge visitors..."

History of FOHR

- 2006: Clear cut of Ridge announced
- 2007: FOHR formed as 501(c)3
- 1 year to raise purchase price: \$1.3 million for value of trees and 130 acres
- 2008
 - >\$100,000 raised
 - Donations, Index Arts Festival & Heybrook Hoedown
 - \$500,000 anonymous donation
 - \$640,000 SnoCo Conservation Futures Grant
- A park is born



History of FOHR

- 2009-2011
 - Recession still upon us
 - Index Arts Festival and Hoedown
 - Diversions
 - Trees and land preserved and willing to wait
- 2012
 - \$299K Conservation Futures Grant to fund property purchases for land bordering Index-Galena Road for
 - trailhead
 - parking lot
 - lowland trail





- "The HRCP Annex"
 - —9.9 acres on south side of Ridge donated to HRCP by FOHR
 - -Stunning view of Canyon Falls
 - –Goal: Viewpoint as spur trail on way to USFS Heybrook Fire Lookout Trail





2014

- 2 north side properties added
 - At last!
 - Safe access to Ridge from Index-Galena Rd
 - Parking for visitors (NOT in town)
 - Trailhead location known
- 3rd north side property elusive but "willing seller"
- Arts Fest and Hoedown, of course



2015

~2 mile Phase 1
 Trail on north side designed & aligned by Chris Mueller,
 SnoCo Parks' Senior Park Planner
 Transferred to Seattle Parks & Rec



- Fundraising
- •Cultural Resources Assessment for HRCP completed





Cultural Resources Assessment of HRCP Land

- Mandated by State, via Dept of Archaeology and Historic Preservation
- Final report showed no culturally significant artifacts found (let the trail busting begin!)
- Tribes concur with plan for trail
- "Inadvertent Discovery Plan": if potential artifact found, construction pauses until significance determined
- Here's why caution is warranted...

Local BackStory

- Native American dwellings first existed in Puget Sound area ~2500 years ago
- Lee Pickett, 1912: "Mahalia, 114 years old"



Local BackStory

- Euro-Americans arrived in NW late 1700s
- Skykomish Tribe had established villages along Skykomish River drainage system
- Skykomish Tribe hit hard by non-native effects
 - Diseases, especially smallpox
 - Land claims on traditional hunting and fishing areas
 - Population of tribe: 400 in 1849, 175 in 1852

Industrious Euro-Americans

- Washington Territory est'd in 1853, Snohomish County in 1861, WA statehood in 1889
- By early 1860s miners explored this area
- Early 1890s: logging operations along wagon road from Sultan to Index
- 1893: Great Northern Railroad built along Skykomish, South Fork, and Tye Rivers, crossing crest of Cascades at Stevens Pass









Figure 2.2 Southern view of the town of Index, the Index-Galena Lumber Company, (established in 1908) and Heybrook Ridge in 1929. (Photo by Lee Pickett)


Land Filled: No Wonder Artifacts were Not Found








What a Difference 100 Years Can Make

- Build Trails
 - FOHR has pledged \$40,000 for Phase 1 Trail
 - Our current balance is \$55,000

 - Wetland trail w/easy access at base of north side
 - South side with views of Bridal Veil Falls
- Local steward role continues and evolves
- Educational opportunities abound
